ACEs – The Adverse Childhood Experiences Study

The webinar will provide participants with an overview of the Adverse Childhood Experiences Study (ACEs Study). The ACEs is a large study which demonstrated a relationship between 10 categories of abuse, neglect, and household dysfunction in childhood and mental and physical illness in childhood and adulthood. We now understand the neural and biological mechanisms that have a powerful and proportional effect on the brains and bodies of people over a lifetime and have a profound effect on the most pressing public health problems in West Virginia.
